There's a new face on the Coastal Electric Cooperative Board of Directors—Joseph Fillmore Gill IV of Fleming.

A director search committee selected Gill in April to complete the unexpired term of the late Jack Waters, who passed away in December. Gill attended his first board meeting in May.

A lifelong resident of Liberty County, Gill has deep-rooted family ties with the co-op, as his greatgrandfather also served on the board.

"I have always admired, respected and witnessed firsthand the values of Coastal Electric," Gill says. "Even as a child attending Annual Meetings with my father, Coastal Electric's commitment to the community was evident to me by the professional performance in our community and the generosity given back by its members. ... The electric cooperative has built a sustainable and remarkable culture in




Coastal Electric Cooperative offices will be closed Tuesday, July 4. We wish our members a safe and happy Independence Day!



Coastal Electric members fund \$30,000 in scholarships to local students

oastal Electric Cooperative members are helping six local students pursue their dreams by way of \$30,000 in scholarships.

Recent graduates Emma Beasley (Liberty County High School), Madeline Ike (First Preparatory Christian Academy), Austin Rowe (McIntosh County Academy), Samuel Montone (home-schooled), and Jolie Claudio and Ella Snider (Richmond Hill High School) each earned \$5,000 Coastal Electric Cooperative Foundation scholarships for their first semester of college. Each scholarship is renewable for up to four years for a total of \$20,000.

Primary funding for Coastal Electric Cooperative Foundation scholarships comes from Operation Round Up, a voluntary program in which Coastal Electric members allow their electric bills to be rounded up to the next whole dollar each month. That spare change is invested back into the community through the foundation to help meet food, health, safety, education and shelter needs of citizens in Bryan, Liberty, Long and McIntosh counties.

In addition, Richmond Hill High graduate Hayes Valentine competed with students across Georgia to win a \$1,000 Walter Harrison Scholarship, named for the late Walter Harrison of Millen, who was known for his
